- Shallow and crowded. Can only be accessed through three narrow straits



Finland's NATO-membership April 2023 - NATO's border to Russia doubled - 1.300 km - 830 m

Newsweek – 4.10.2022 - headline: As NATO member, Finland could have nuclear weapons 600 m (965 km) from Kremlin




Military legacy WWI + WWII - Chemical and conventional ammunition in the Baltic Sea



CBNW (Chemical, Biological & Nuclear Warfare) Magazine – 29.10.24

- the Baltic Sea is one of the most polluted waters worldwide
- contaminated by hundreds of thousands of tons of munitions dating back as far as WW I
- approx. 160,000 mines were laid in the Baltic Sea during WW I and II.
- Mine clearance 1996-2022 showed that ab. 25% of contact mines remain in the area where they were sunk. 75% of ground mines remain in the positions where they were laid.

- after WW II approx. 300,000 tons of bombs, torpedoes, rockets, mines, depth charges, artillery shells, explosives, propellants, and chemical warfare agents were dumped at the sea bottom
- ignored for 80 years, they have gradually degraded and leaked their toxic contents into the water



Finnish Environment Institute (SYKE) – 2020

- The Baltic Sea is the most radioactive in the world with caesium-137
- Main cause Chernobyl nuclear power plant accident 1986: about 82% of caesium
- Russia nuclear testing: about 14% of caesium.
 Novaya Zemlya archipelago in the Arctic Ocean (i.a. Tsar Bomba, Oct. 1961)

European Environment Agency 16.4.24

- Measurements in Baltic (and North) Sea water showed substantial PFAS contamination between 2005 and 2018
- PFAS = a group of forever chemicals Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances
- pose risks to marine organisms and human health


Declaration from the conference in St. Petersburg Sent to:

- The governments and members of parliaments in the Baltic and Arctic regions
- The United Nations (UN)
- United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO)
- Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE)
- The Arctic Council
- The Inuit Circumpolar Council (ICC)
- Baltic Marine Environment Protection Commission (also known as the Helsinki Commission HELCOM)
- North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)
- the Legislative Assemblies of St. Petersburg and the Leningrad Region

- immediate halt to escalation in Ukraine
- stop to weapons deliveries to Ukraine
- parties sincerely to work for a permanent peaceful solution
- prioritize UN initiatives, resolutions and treaties
- Arctic and Baltic states to sign and ratify the TPNW (Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons)
- Arctic and Baltic regions to be made nuclear-weapons-free and demilitarized zones of peace
- restitution of the OSCE as necessary framework for peace in Europe and the world. (Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe)

•	Russia to be included in all HELCOM meetings	

- restore the Arctic Council work and include Russia
- cooperation between Indigenous people across the Arctic borders
- open borders, facilitation of interstate exchanges, restoring people-to people programs
- move the money from the military
- emphasis on human and common security, prioritize peace, climate cooperation, environmental sustainability, equitable resource distribution, social, health and education security
